## WHY WAS CHILDREN'S MIRACLE NETWORK HOSPITALS NOMINATED?

Melissa, Business Administrator at Consolidated Construction nominated Children's Miracle Network Hospitals by sharing her experience with Children's Wisconsin:

"My personal experience was when my oldest, Jack was 1 month old and then again at 6 months old. Imagine being a first time parent and having your child go through 2 surgeries before the age of one. At one month old, Jack had to have Pyloric Stenosis surgery. The surgeon had to widen the opening of the pyloric muscle which is the muscle in between the stomach and small intestines. This would allow Jack to be able to digest his milk without projectile vomiting after every feeding. The surgery was performed at Children's Hospital of Neenah. We had to spend 2 nights in the hospital and were able to sleep in Jack's room both nights. Of course not getting any sleep as Jack couldn't eat for several hours before and after his surgery. With the exception of sugar water drops every once in a while. He has a tiny scar on his belly from the surgery. Thankfully no long term issues. Jack loves to eat all kinds of foods, with sushi being his favorite!

The second time with Jack was at Children's Hospital of Milwaukee, where he had a 5 hour surgery on his skull. Jack was born with Craniosynostosis, which is a condition where the skull develops abnormally in utero. The cranial sutures fuse together prematurely. Jack never had a soft spot on the top of his head and had a dent in his forehead that didn't go away after he was born. We took Jack to Children's Hospital in Milwaukee for a CT scan when he was 4 months old and surgery was scheduled for 2 months later. We spent the night before surgery at the Ronald McDonald house and then 2 nights in the ICU and 2 nights in a regular recovery room. Every assistant, nurse, doctor, and neuro surgeon were all so amazing making sure we understood everything Jack was going through and about his home care. Jack has a zig-zag scar on his head that starts from one ear and goes up over the top of his head to his other ear, along with two spots where the drainage tubes were. Jack had a few monthly check ups after surgery and then yearly check ups until he was 7 1/2 years old. Jack is now your average smart and sassy teenager, and I wouldn't trade him for the world."
